1. Call to Order

Chair Madeline Bracken called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m.

2. Public Comments

None.

3. Consider approval of Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Committee meeting minutes of April 2, 2026

Action:

Polly Williams motioned to approve the Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Committee meeting minutes of April 2, 2026 as presented. Motion was seconded by Desiree Ramirez and carried unanimously (7-0).

4. Hear update on Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Projects

Chair Bracken provided updates on recent Keep Waxahachie Beautiful initiatives. The Spring Cleanup was successful, with 45 volunteers collecting 390 pounds of trash across two locations, while Dumpster Days served 142 households and filled 8 dumpsters. Due to the event's success, the two-location format may be used again for the fall cleanup.

Updates were also shared on the Nicholas P. Sims Library Project, including thriving H-E-B grant-funded plants, ongoing support from the Indian Trail Master Naturalists, and a new customized

sign currently in production. The library irrigation system remains unrepaired, though recent rainfall has helped maintain the landscaping.

Committee Member Forrest John reported that discussions with Waste Connections regarding the recycling program are ongoing, with Director of Parks & Recreation Gumaro Martinez set to follow up. Chair Bracken and Committee Member Desiree Ramirez also shared updates on school career day presentations and encouraged additional committee volunteers for future events.

5. Hear update on Cleanup Closet

Updates were provided on the Cleanup Closet program and volunteer efforts. Year-to-date, 258 volunteers have collected 1,176 pounds of garbage. Staff reported that all major cleanup events, along with four smaller recent cleanups, have been entered into the database to help maintain eligibility for future equipment opportunities. A suggestion was also made to ask volunteers how they learned about cleanup events in order to better evaluate marketing efforts, with social media currently serving as the primary outreach source.

The Committee also discussed an upcoming cleanup event with the Google Data Center, which will provide 50 volunteers along with equipment such as boats and kayaks. Members discussed identifying a “heavy duty” cleanup location with water access, including possible sites along Trunk Creek south of downtown near Highway 77 and another creek area near the DMV.

6. Discuss Keep Waxahachie Beautiful impact and direction

The Committee discussed several recycling and waste diversion initiatives aimed at increasing Keep Waxahachie Beautiful’s community impact. Members reaffirmed support for a bulk cardboard recycling initiative and requested that it be reconsidered during the current budget process. Additional discussion included a student-led plastics recycling container currently available at one location and the value of expanding metal recycling efforts.

Concerns were also raised regarding usable items being discarded during Dumpster Days events. Committee members discussed potential waste diversion strategies, including organizing a “freecycle” or swap event, partnering with local organizations such as Bethlehem Revisited, and utilizing volunteers during Dumpster Days to help redirect reusable items to nonprofit organizations. The possibility of creating a separate collection line for reusable items in partnership with the Salvation Army was also suggested.

7. Discuss and review current Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Committee bylaws and take any necessary action

The Committee discussed proposed amendments to the Keep Waxahachie Beautiful bylaws, including removing the Chamber-appointed ex officio seat due to ongoing lack of attendance and participation, and revising Article VII to require committee members to attend at least two committee-sponsored events within a rolling twelve-month period. The general consensus of the Committee was to move forward with the proposed amendments and submit them to legal counsel for review.

Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Committee

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Action:

Polly Williams moved to request that the City Council amend the bylaws to remove the Chamber-appointed ex officio seat due to continued lack of attendance and participation, and to amend Article VII of the bylaws to require committee members to attend at least two KWBC-sponsored events within a rolling twelve-month period. Motion was seconded by Forrest John and carried unanimously (7-0).

8. Discuss Composting Grant

Chair Bracken presented an informational sheet regarding a proposed composting grant pilot program aimed at reducing organic waste in local schools and community gardens.

The Committee discussed purchasing Aerobin 400 composting systems for distribution through a pilot program focused initially on schools. The program is expected to provide approximately 6–8 composting units, with recipients required to track usage data for one year in exchange for retaining the equipment.

Applications for the program are expected to be released soon, with selections anticipated in August or September 2026 for a fall program launch.

It was the consensus of the Committee to allocate \$580 in matching funds to supplement a \$500 private donation, creating a total project budget of \$1,080.

9. Hear update on Keep Texas Beautiful Conference being held May 12–14, 2026

Administrative Coordinator Morgan Davis provided the dates and location for the virtual conference.

10. Set next meeting date and time

The next Keep Waxahachie Beautiful Committee meeting will be held August 6, 2026 at 4:30 p.m.

Findings

Overall residue of 28.3% is just below average for surrounding municipalities

The NCTCOG states that 22% is the region avg for Residue

In comparison Fort Worth is a 27%

Areas of opportunity include grocery bags and textiles which cannot be recycled curbside

Plastic bags took up 2% of the residue while textiles 5%
